This past week was wonderful. My new companion is the grandson of Melvin and Denean Beals from my Mesa home ward. We had interviews with President Clark this week which really gave me an added boost and gave me some things to focus on the rest of this transfer and the next. President Clark gave me some great counsel on finishing strong which I was grateful to receive. President Clark reminisced about his own mission and shared some experiences that he had. I always love those moments because you can see in his eyes as he thinks about it that he cherishes those moments of his life. That's the same way I feel about my mission. I'm so excited to experience these next final two months and work as hard as I can because I know that I will re-live every moment for the rest of my life. I have been transferred to Pittsburg, Ca. and am serving as a Zone Leader. My companion is Elder Daniels, who was my trainer. In our zone is also an Elder I trained and a missionary he trained, so in our own mission lingo, we are 4 generations; grandfather, father, son and grand-son. That doesn't happen too often. We have had an exciting month here. We have had a stake conference, and Elder Rasband from the Presidency of the 70 came to reorganize the stake and held some training meetings with the missionaries. It was so good! We had interviews with Pres. Beck and he always has good advice for all of us. We had a zone conference with presentations by Pres. Beck and the Assistants to the President.

We have met and are working with some awesome and promising investigators. We were tracting one day and met a man named Juan who was sitting in his car on the side of the road. We visited a bit and asked if we could visit him at his home to teach him a lesson and he asked us when our church meets and if we could drop by his house on Sunday so he could follow us to the building. He gave us his phone number and we called and he did follow us to church. I think he enjoyed it. He is here without his family who are back in Honduras. He seems very humble and ready to hear the gospel. We held a home evening with 3 small families, 2 of which are inactive. They have small kids, so we made kites and flew them at the park and taught them that the commandments are like the kite strings. Although it looks like they hold us back, they actually keep us flying. One little boy thought it would go higher if he let go, so turned loose. It flew over a house and got caught on the roof. The kite continued to stay aloft, but the string was now caught on someone's roof, irretrievable. It turned out to be a good teaching moment.

We had expected to baptize a lady who has been having lessons with her husband. Somehow it had slipped up that they were not married and during her interview, the baptism had to be postponed until they can get married. It offended her husband and he asked the missionaries to not come back to their home. The teaching Elders were devastated and asked for suggestions for mending the misunderstanding. It was Mother's Day week, so an idea popped into our heads and we suggested they make cookies and take them to the couple. They did and no one was home so they left the cookies on the doorstep with a note. When they arrived home, there was a phone message from the husband asking them to call. They did and the husband apologized and asked them to return and continue teaching them as soon as possible. It was a neat experience.

This week is the annual Latino Festival put on by the church at Temple Hill, where the Oakland Temple and Interstake Center is located. All the wards in the mission are going to do some kind of dance and serve native foods. They will have a dance after. We cannot participate in that part, but the event should be a great missionary opportunity for all of the members in the Oakland area.

My turn in the Mission Office has expired and I am now serving in Chelyabinsk as a zone leader. My companion is Elder Boles, a really good missionary and an extremely hard worker. I am excited but nervous, like always, when I have something new to do. It is still pretty cold here. About 3 weeks ago, it warmed up into the 60s and 70s and we thought summer was coming, but then it dropped to 37 F again.

Easter in Russia, is a pretty big holiday but they hold it on a different date from the States. This year, it was on Apr. 27th where it was in March in the States. It appears that although it is a religious holiday here, most of the population celebrates by getting completely hammered. It is a sad note on such a significant remembrance of the life of our savior.

We found a couple of new investigators last week. As we were out walking, a guy pulled over on the road and told us his son had met with missionaries earlier and he was taking English lessons from them. We invited him to join us for the next lesson. He asked if we could help his son immigrate to America but we told him we couldn't. Thursday night, we were at the church for a meeting and a guy came in and wanted to meet with us. We set up an appointment for the next evening. In the English class, the spiritual thought was on prayer and he had really liked it. So we went to his apartment for a missionary lesson with him and his dad opened the door and it was the auv who had stopped us on the street. The lesson went well and we are hoping they will continue to let us come and teach them. I woke up at 2:30 am back the last day of April. There were loud noises coming from the street. As I went to the window to investigate, there was a huge column of tanks driving down our street. Behind the tanks were some really big army vehicles and then 5 or 6 huge trucks carrying missiles. It was quite strange. I am assuming it was for their May Day parade.

I had to renew my visa so made a trip to Moscow and Estonia. We found a Papa Johns Pizza

place in moscow and ate there. It was so good to eat real American Pizza again. We got to see Lenin's "grave" on Red Square. It is not really a

grave, he is not buried, just preserved under glass. It was cool to see the old leader of the Soviet Union. We rented bikes, and rode out of the city along the beach to some parks and monuments. I got back to Chely saturday evening. Yesterday we went to a little city called Miass with a member of the district presidency who needed to do some branch business and then we spoke in Sacrament Meeting. Miass is about 1.5 hours away, if you drive fast.

On Easter, everybody says, "Christ is resurrected" and you are supposed to respond, "In truth, He is resurrected!" On that note, have a great week.

We had some excitement this month. During a missionary district conference, Sister Carmack came and pulled me out of the meeting and told me that she was having trouble with the stove to bake some cookies. As we headed for the kitchen I could tell that she had left the gas on while she came to get me. I knew in my mind that the last thing I wanted to do was turn on the oven. Unfortunately, that's the first thing Sister Carmack did before I could tell her not to. The leaking gas blew up and there was guite a bit of fire but she wasn't burned, just a bit of singed hair. The good news is that the cookies were OK! Then there was the bus episode. There has been a lot of drug traffic going on here in Tijuana which seems to create a lot of violence. As Elder Garcia and I were riding back to our area, an armed man jumped on the bus at a stop, yelled that the driver owed him money and shot and killed the bus driver. The gunman jumped off the bus and into an SUV and he was gone. All of this happened in less than 3 seconds. I was scared to death. Up to that point, I had never witnessed a murder. I had heard about other missionaries having things like that happen to them, but not to me. It was something I'll never forget.

We are teaching an awesome family. They live in very humble circumstances in a single room, run down apartment with dirt floors. They are not well off financially, but they have accepted the gospel and want to get baptized. I love the humble people of Tijuana.

In preparation for President Heyn, the new mission president, I have been making "guides" that include pictures of every missionary in the mission, maps and directions to every chapel and missionary apartment, phone numbers of apartments, stake presidencies, bishoprics etc. It is a lot of work. Saying goodby to Pres. Carmack will be hard for me personally, but

getting to know and work with President Heyn will be a great opportunity. I'm really excited.

I had an awesome experience recently. Elder Hernandez, the area seventy for the mission area, gave Elder Garcia and I a ride to a local stake center. We asked how he came to be a seventy. He said that it was the most humbling and most overwhelming experience of his life. He described the experience in a humorous manner. He said that he was just a normal member of the Church, minding his own business, and he got a phone call from an apostle asking him to be the area seventy over Tijuana. He went to Salt Lake City that April for a conference involving every general authority in the Church. During the conference, Elder Hernandez said that he was extremely touched. Throughout the trainings, talks and discourses given by the apostles and the first presidency, he had received direct revelation from God that President Hinckley was the prophet of God. It wasn't a burning is his bosom nor a still small voice. He had received knowledge that Pres. Hinckley was the prophet of God. He said that he no longer had a testimony. I asked myself the question, "How can one testify of Christ if he doesn't have a testimony?" The answer was simple. It had become knowledge. Of course, it is still his calling to testify of Christ. That is why general authorities are special witnesses of Christ. They don't need a testimony because it has become knowledge.
