We have been teaching an 18-year-old girl named Johanna and last week I had the opportunity to baptize her. She has been a golden contact. She seems to just drink up the gospel as we teach her. We were teaching a young man that has a testimony and we set a baptism date but his family is very much against the church so for the last few weeks each time we go to see him they say he is gone even though we know he is not. We had a wonderful week full of blessings and miracles. Sunday of

last week, as all of the missionaries in the district called in their

numbers, I really tried to encourage them all to do their best to reach the goals they had set. As missionaries, we set goals all the time, but there's a huge difference between SETTING a goal and actually WORKING toward achieving that goal. The true blessings come when we set our goals in faith and then do everything in our power to achieve those goals. When we have an attitude like that we are then able to pray with faith and plead with the Lord to add his help to our efforts in accomplishing our desires.

Someone had the brilliant idea to ride bikes to Oakland today for P-day. Oakland is about 45 minutes away by car. We left at 7:00 am this morning

and finally arrived at I pm. It was one crazy adventure. We had to get off and walk for some of the time because we were too tired to pump uphill. We coasted down from the top of the last hill right to the temple and mission office. We were beat. We could barely walk and also starving. So, we stopped at a pizza place and grabbed something to eat. We rode home on BART, the local transit system. We are going to sleep good tonight! It was a really fun trip, although I never want to do it by bike again! We kept saying "This is the worst idea we ever had"!

We had some amazing experiences this past week. Some of them might be hard to believe. You could say they were coincidences, but I know it was the hand of the Lord moving His work along. We've been teaching a girl named Yasmin and one day she wasn't home, but her sister was. Hazel told us she had the lessons a few years ago but "dropped out". We had a good conversation with her and then taught both sisters a few awesome lessons. They ask good questions and have a good understanding of the Gospel. We feel really good about them accepting baptism.

While trying to make contact with a lady who never seemed to be home, we met her brother-in-law and his friend and got into a short lesson with them. They have invited us back again. He asked "So, how important is it for me to know that God called Joseph Smith as a prophet today?" We invited him to eat dinner on Thursday at a member's house - a few streets away. As we talked to him, I could totally picture him getting baptized, literally, and seeing him all dressed in his baptismal clothes. That may seem weird, but as we walked away, I told my companion. He said he had experienced the same thing. Hopefully that will become reality!

So the other day we were tracting and ran into a Mexican anti-Mormon. I didn't know they existed! He laid into us and told us all kinds of things about how the FBI had proved that Joseph Smith was a fraud and that none of his prophesies had been fulfilled. My companion and I both were really frustrated and he looked like he was going to get violent. We just walked away. We drove to our next appointment and arrived 20 minutes early. The AP's taught us a new way to find people and asked us to try it out. They said to set a specific time and place (like an actual appointment) to find someone that is ready to hear the gospel. As we arrived at the street, we got out and started tracting. Before we even knocked a door, we saw a lady sitting on her porch. We went and talked to her. We were so amazed that it was the first person we talked to. I know this new system really works now and I am sold on it. We are going to do it every week. I have some good news! We have an investigator that was baptized June 7th. I just got transferred here the last part of May so have not worked a whole lot with him, but it is still way cool! He is 19. accepted the gospel and understands it very well. He has a testimony and the missionaries have only been working with him for 3 months, which is kind of quick here. He never seemed to be very confident about praying out loud, so we talked a little bit with him about it and then Elder Boles had the idea that all of us would pray in turns. Elder Boles went first and then me and then Sergie prayed. It was awesome! His prayer was so sincere and it was obvious that he meant what he was saying. It was such a great experience for him and for us. His mother was not in favor of him getting baptized, which made

it all the more miraculous. We held the baptism in the morning at a local lake, so it was pretty cold - about 50 degrees. Sergie took it like a champ. When they were standing in the water, both of them were shivering with the cold. We did the baptism really quick at the lake and then went back to the church for the talks and a little program. I did not really do much at all, but I certainly appreciated the joy that Sergie had in that spiritual moment.

Tuesday, Elder Boles and I went to Miass which is a small city about 2 hours away. It is beautiful and in the mountains. We don't have many mountains around here. You have probably heard of the Ural Mtns but they are basically just hills, at least the parts I've seen.

We have been working with some inactives. We had a good meeting with a fellow who basically lives at his work place. He only goes home to shower and eat. He is a security quard for some garages and in one of the garages, he has a little shoe repair shop. He lives a hard life. His family is very poor. We held a lesson with him about the Book of Mormon and how we can find happiness and peace by reading and applying the principles of the B of M. We gave him a small copy he can keep at work and he says he will read it. We plan to go back soon and have him repair our shoes. We are also meeting with an investigator named Eddik who has to travel 3 hours to meet with us. He actually makes the trip each appointment and wants to be baptized. He read the whole Book of Mormon in one night and the next morning. He says he

believes in the Plan of Salvation, and the Word of Wisdom. He says he will give up smoking. The trick is that he will be gone for 3 months and can't be back to be baptized until Sept. He thinks he can do it all. We are wishing the best for him and hoping we will still be here when he returns and that his faith will sustain him in the meantime!

We attended a small branch at a little town called Kishtim, last Sunday. There were about 7 members that meet in a member's apartment. There are no missionaries assigned to Kishtim because the radiation levels are too high. The Zone Leaders visit there about once a month. We have 2 branches here in Chelyabinks with about 50 in our branch and abt. 40 in the other. We meet in an office building where the Church rents one floor. We got transfers today and my comp will be moving and my new companion will be Elder Scott, whom I know very well. He is a good missionary and we will enjoy serving together. It's getting hot here. This past week was so busy. We hardly got to spend any time working in our area. We were busy all week preparing everything for the arrival of Pres. Heyn and his wife. Pres. Carmack spent the week speaking at zone conferences. He encouraged all of us to continue

working hard as a mission. He talked about what is most important for us to be doing as missionaries. Number one is to sanctify ourselves. Number two is to baptize. Many times we get caught up in baptisms and just getting numbers. We need to look at ourselves to see what we can improve on as individuals. He also said, "Life is short, leave a legacy." This mission experience, in reality, is so short. I'm just starting to realize that. The time goes so incredibly fast. President told us to leave the mission better than we found it. He is a great example of that. When he arrived here in July of 2005, the mission was baptizing 140-150 per month. He and his wife seem like wonderful people. President Heyn's English is perfect and his wife has a bit of an accent but she has excellent English skills. She taught Spanish at a high school near Lehi, Utah. I have found Pres. Heyn to be different compared to Pres. Carmack, but I'm adjusting to his methods and I know that I'll enjoy my time serving here with him. I will probably continue to serve here until Oct. and then be transferred. It seems a long way off right now, but it really is just around the corner.

The Story of the Star Spangled Banner

During the War of 1812, the British marched through Washington DC in 1814, burning the White House and the Capital buildings, and then marched on to

Baltimore, Md. In September, 1814, Frances Scott Key, a Baltimore lawyer, and John S. Skinner, an American prisoner-exchange agent, set sail for a British ship moored in the Baltimore harbor, flying a flag of truce, on a mission approved by President James Madison. Their objective was to secure the release of Dr. William Beanes, the elderly and popular town physician of Baltimore, and a friend of Key's who had been captured in his home. Beanes was accused of aiding the arrest of British soldiers. Key and Skinner boarded the British flagship and spoke with the British Admiral over dinner, while he and some of his officers discussed war plans. At first, the Dr's release was refused, but after Key and Skinner showed them letters written by wounded British prisoners praising Beanes and other Americans for their kind treatment, it was agreed he would be released.

Because Key and Skinner had heard details of the plans for the attack on Baltimore, they were held captive until after the battle ended.

During the stormy night of battle, Key had witnessed the bombardment and observed that the fort's smaller "storm flag" continued to fly, but once the shell and rocket barrage had stopped, he would not know how the battle had turned out until dawn. By then, the storm flag had been lowered, and the larger flag had been raised.

Key was inspired by the American victory and the sight of the large American flag flying triumphantly above the fort. Aboard the ship the next day, Key wrote a poem on the back of a letter he had kept in his pocket. At twilight on 16 September, he and Skinner were released. He finished the poem at the Indian Queen Hotel, where he was staying. Key gave the poem to his brother-in-law, Judge Joseph H. Nicholson and suggested it be sung to the tune of an old, popular, British gentleman's song which had been written by a Brit in 1776. Nicholson took the poem to a printer in Baltimore, who anonymously printed copies of it. It was originally called "Defence of Fort McHenry." The song's popularity increased over many years but it wasn't until March 1931 that it was officially made the National Anthem by Pres. Herbert Hoover. By then, it had become known as "The Star-Spangled Banner". The flag, with fifteen stars and fifteen stripes, came to be known as the "Star Spangled Banner Flag" and is today on display in the Smithsonian Institution. It was restored in 1914, and again in 1998 as part of an ongoing conservation program.

The flag was made by Mary Pickersgill, a professional flag maker. The army, in the summer of 1813, gave her a contract to make two flags for Ft. McHenry. The smaller storm flag, was 17 X 25 feet and the larger official flag was 30 X 42 feet. The larger flag was about the size of a quarter of a basketball court and it consisted of 15 stripes of red and white British wool bunting, and a blue field which contained 15 stars made of cotton fabric. At that time, there were 15 states, thus the 15 stars and stripes. Mary was paid \$405.90 to make the large flag and \$168.54 for the storm flag. She was assisted by her 13 year old daughter, Caroline, and her 2 nieces, Eliza and Margaret Young and her mother, Rebecca Young, who was also a professional flag maker. Mary started the flag in her Baltimore home, but when it came time to lay out the flag to add the stars, her house wasn't large enough so a nearby brewery gave her the use of their empty mail room where she finished the flag. In 1777 Congress declared the American flag to be 13 alternating stripes of red and white with a union of 13 white stars in a blue field. In 1794, Kentucky and Vermont joined the Union and congress added 2 stars and 2 stripes. In 1818, five more states had joined so Congress changed the design to 13 stripes to represent the original 13 states and 20 stars to represent the then current states and provided a star would be added for the admission of each new state.

The large flag became the possession of Maj. George Armistead, the commanding officer over Ft. McHenry during the attack of the British. Over the following years, the Armistead family loaned the flag for parades and pageants for patriotic occasions and particularly to be carried in the annual parade celebrating the anniversary of the Ft. McHenry Battle. In 1912, Maj. Armistead's grandson donated the "Star Spangled Banner" to the Smithsonian where it has been preserved and displayed for over 100 years. It is displayed in its true condition as a tattered but treasured piece of our nation's history. Because of its fragile condition, it has been undergoing a restoration process to preserve its weakened wool and cotton fibers, and a special room is being built for its permanent display. It contains 11 recognizable holes caused by shots fired during the historic battle. Over the years it was in the possession of the Armistead family, 8 feet was cut from the fly end of the flag and cut up into small

pieces and given as mementoes to important people who asked for them and others the family considered worthy of such a memento. His daughter said that nothing would have been left of it if everyone who had asked, had been given a piece. Mrs. Armistead also used scissors to cut one of the stars from the blue field to present to some unknown recipient. She also sewed a narrow red chevron pattern on one of the white stripes, supposedly to represent an "A" for the Armistead family. It is assumed that the smaller storm flag was destroyed or lost in the battle of Ft. McHenry. (Source: Wikipedia) (Quiz on pg. 11)
