Dear Dana Ward Family,

"Obedience is better than Sacrifice" was one of the lessons taught to our youth, as they participated in their pioneer trek earlier this year.

Brother Steven Covey points out that our perception of love may be different from someone else's perception of love. He gives an example of Person A doing something nice for Person B, and then points out that while Person A feels it is an expression of love toward Person B, because that's how Person A would like to be treated, in reality Person B does not recognize it as an expression of love because that is not the way Person B perceives a conveyance of love. Bro. Covey then goes on to point out that the tricky part is to learn what the other person's perception of love is and then to convey your love to them in a way they understand.

With Brother Covey's observation in mind, please consider the following comments about obedience and sacrifice:

President Monson is quoted as saying; "[The] revealed word [from a living Heavenly Father] vividly describes the blessings that obedience brings and the inevitable heartache and despair that accompany the traveler who detours along the forbidden pathways of sin and error.

"To a generation steeped in the tradition of animal sacrifice, Samuel boldly declared, 'To obey is better than sacrifice, and to hearken than the fat of rams' (1 Sam. 15:22). Prophets, ancient and modern, have known the strength that comes through obedience. Think of Nephi: 'I will go and do the things which the Lord hath commanded' (1 Ne. 3:7). Or Alma's beautiful description of the strength possessed by the sons of Mosiah: 'They had waxed strong in the knowledge of the truth; for they were men of a sound understanding and they had searched the scriptures diligently, that they might know the word of God. But this is not all; they had given themselves to much prayer, and fasting; therefore they had the spirit of prophecy, and the spirit of revelation, and when they taught, they taught with power and authority of God' (Alma 17:2–3).

"The strength that we earnestly seek today to meet the challenges of a complex and changing world can be ours when, with fortitude and resolute courage, we stand and declare with Joshua, 'As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord' (<u>Josh. 24:15</u>)." In other words, the strength

we earnestly seek comes from our obedience to the will of the Lord.

Regarding the sacrifice of the pioneers in their desire to be obedient, Elder M. Russell Ballard says; "We find one of the most touching stories of sacrifice, faith, and loving charity in the life of Jens Neilson, who was a member of the Willie Handcart Company. Jens, a relatively prosperous Danish farmer, heeded the call to bring his family to Zion. In Iowa he wrote that he had let all of his money go to the Church except enough to buy a handcart and stock it with 15 pounds of belongings per person. Jens wrote, 'Obedience is better than sacrifice.' Traveling with Jens was his wife Elsie; their six-year-old son, Neils; and a nine-year-old girl, Bodil Mortensen, whom Jens offered to take to Utah. In the early Wyoming blizzard, temperatures plummeted below zero. The Neilsons had consumed their last pound of flour days before, but somehow they made it over the treacherous Rocky Ridge, urged on by their indomitable courage and unconquerable faith. Tragically, 13 of the company died at Rock Creek and were buried in shallow, snow-covered graves - among them, Jens and Elsie's son, Neils, and young Bodil Mortensen.

"Jens arrived at Rock Creek, 11 miles beyond Rocky Ridge, with both feet frozen. He was unable to walk another step and pleaded with Elsie, 'Leave me by the trail in the snow to die, and you go ahead and try to keep up with the company and save your life.' Elsie, with her unfaltering pioneer courage, replied, 'Ride. I can't leave you. I can pull the cart.'"

During His ministry, Jesus taught; "If ye love me, keep my commandments." (John 14:15) This single verse of scripture clearly blesses us with the knowledge of how to truly express our love and gratitude to a loving Heavenly Father and His Son, our Savior. At this time of year our thoughts reflect upon the stories of obedience and sacrifice found among the pages of our great pioneer heritage. As we remember their examples, may we continue to dedicate our lives and efforts to the strengthening of the Church in our day, through our obedience, as an expression of our love. In the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen. Brother Mark Standage

NOT YOUR USUAL PIONEER STORY!

This Pioneer story begins in faraway Ashville, Jefferson County, Florida sometime in the late 1800's. Uriah and Ludie lived in town and were quite successful by the standards of that day. They knew nothing of farming, roughing it or living completely by their wits! They had 3 young sons.

Some Mormon missionaries came along preaching the Gospel and the young family were baptized and made the decision to sell all their property and belongings and move to Salt Lake City. Utah to be near the central hub of the Church and its members. They were enroute to Salt Lake by train when they met some representatives of the Church, traveling to El Paso, Texas. This LDS group were on their way to visit the Mormon Colonies in Old Mexico. When they got to El Paso, Uriah decided to purchase tickets and travel with the Mormon group to Colonia Juarez. After looking over several little Mormon communities, Uriah and Ludie decided to homestead a piece of land and they settled into the little mountain community of Garcia. Like so many of the town's men. Uriah took his turn working at the lumber mill farther up in the mountains. The community leaders had secured a contract to cut timber for the rail road that was being built through the Sierra Madre Mtns. One rainy Sunday afternoon at the lumber camp, Uriah was in his tent resting when lightening hit a nearby tree which fell on Uriah's tent and killed him. Ludie was left a widow with three children to raise on her own.

Living conditions in Mexico were extremely primitive. There was no electricity or plumbing and no stores other than the little family co-ops. They sold only bare essentials which were purchased in Juarez or El Paso when some family could make the rare trip for supplies. Ludie had to learn how to operate a kerosene lamp, the installation and operation of an 'out house' and preparing and cooking foods from scratch. Butter came from the cream you skimmed off your milk and was then processed in the family churn. Eggs came from chickens you raised yourself and fried chicken came from the hens that ran around your yard that you butchered and cleaned yourself. Even cornmeal and flour came from the corn or wheat that had to be grown locally and then ground by hand at your own kitchen table or on the back porch. Ludie was a 'city girl' and was accustomed to purchasing canned foods and meat from a local butcher shop. She was used to sending out the family laundry to be done and returned by a local laundress or washed, hung to dry and ironed by hired

domestic help. She was ill prepared for having to raise and provide for her family from a garden (which she did not have) and milking a cow (which she did not own) and raising and butchering her own fowls and pigs (which she did not have). Sister Ludie and her young family were nearing the end of their meager supplies when some RS sisters visited her and left a small bag of pinto beans. After they left, Ludie opened the bag. She had never seen pinto beans before. They were too hard to bite into and she decided the 'sisters' had played a cruel joke on her. She threw the beans out into the front yard and was crying in despair when the Bishop's 12 year old son knocked at her door with some extra milk from their family cow. He inquired about the beans scattered in the dirt in her front vard and the reason for her distress. Ludie told him about the beans. The young boy laughed and began picking up the beans and explained to her how she had to soak them overnight and boil them all day and then they would be really good to eat. This reduced Ludie to a new set of tears and she lamented to the young 12 year old that she didn't even know something as basic as what to do with dried beans and she was never going to survive here in the mtns. of Mexico. She would have to write to her brother to send them train fare to return to Florida. There at least, she had family that could help her raise the children, even though it concerned her that none of them were members of the Church. The 12 year old pleaded with her not to abandon Garcia. He would think of something and immediately his eyes lit up and he said, "I know! You can marry my Dad! He's the Bishop and he will take care of you!" This made Ludie laugh at his over-simplified solution to the problem, but the boy told her not to worry, he would go ask his father right away! Sure enough, the boy came back within a very short time, with his father by the hand. Bishop Whetten had come to check on this discouraged member of his little flock. the Bishop saw to it that the family had food and instructed the RS sisters to help Ludie learn the skills she needed to prepare their 'natural' foods and other homemaking skills she needed to survive. Eventually, Bishop Whetton did marry Ludie as a plural wife. She moved with the Whetten family when the Saints left Mexico in 1912 during the Mexican Revolution. They settled in New Mexico in the area around a little Mormon community known as Bluewater.

An elderly Ludie, in reflecting back over her life, once remarked "Well, you might say that some of us converts just didn't know BEANS about pioneering but thanks to the spirit of brotherhood and sisterhood, we all pretty much made it through the tough times and survived."

I've been working out in the mornings but it is winter down here now and about 45 degrees every morning. We have a heater but only in the bedroom. We exercise in another room and it's so cold I feel like my joints are frozen. I guess I will have to exercise faster to keep frost from building up!

Sounds like Claire is learning lots of ways to be helpful at home. Doing the dishes works anywhere. I'm glad to hear that Grandma Betsy is doing better. Tell her I love her. I enjoyed hearing about the family having missionaries over for dinner and it occurred to me what a cool experience it would be for me as a missionary to be abe to drop in and eat dinner at my own home.

The work here is greater than ever. This area is progressing well. We had 3 investigators at Church last week. We are now also teaching the boyfriend of a daughter of the Morrado family. We had been told he wanted to be baptized so went out and found him ASAP. He plans to be baptized July 11th and we are sure he will be ready then. Yesterday was great. All 6 elders in our Zone worked our area Monday evening and all day Tuesday and we found 12 new investigators. Next Wednesday is transfers but I'm pretty sure Elder Rodriguez and I are staying here and together. I think my shoes must have been made for a 'driving' missionary. The holes in the bottoms let in the sunshine as well as the rain! I'm trying to find a shoe repair shop to see if they can resole this pair for me, otherwise, I'm going to have to invest in a new pair here locally.

All is well and I'm happy. I'm learning a lot here in the mission field and continue to learn something new every day.

Dallas, Texas is sweet! I'm still in the Dallas 1st and 9th wards. The work is going forth even though the heat + the humidity is a killer. On Wednesday there was a tornado

warning and it rained and stormed really bad. We were told to stay inside and couldn't leave. Luckily we were at the church building. getting ready to take some youth out on splits, but we ended up playing basketball in the gym instead. Thursday is our planning day and that whole morning it poured and rained A LOT. Streets flooded and the lake flooded over. That means the next two days it was over 95% humidity! WOAH! Tracting in that kind of heat results in drenched clothes, shoes and sox – from sweat!

We found two wonderful new prospects in unusual situations. When our appointment canceled on us, we decided we would go tracting on that street. The first door we knocked was a lady by the name of Gloria Garza. She has a few relatives who are members and was in search of an El Libro De Mormon. We gave one to her and taught her and she wants to know a WHOLE LOT MORE she said. Saturday we had another appointment cancel on us and we felt prompted to go tracting in that area. We met a lady who said she knew a "missionary" that she worked with. She is a dental assistant and the man she works with served his mission in Argentina and speaks perfect Spanish. We asked if he had talked about his church and she said "ALL the TIME!" We got a return appointment. The Lord sure is helping us find those who are wanting to learn and be taught about the gospel.

Also, my companion and I ended up playing an impromptu soccer game that resulted in 8 new investigators, so the game was worth it.

We also had a fun encounter yesterday. We were visiting a member in the lower income part of town. As we were walking to her house we got stopped by a large group of black people and one white lady. A very large black man asked, "If we were da Mormons?"

We said, "That's us." He replied, "GOOD! I got your back, and you ever need something let me know, but while you're in my hood I won't let nothing happen to ya." It turned out this man served in the army in UTAH, and married a Mormon lady. They are no longer married, but he has a high respect for us as missionaries. Crazy things happen on your mission when you meet random people willing to help you or experience the life of others through their traditions and games.

I recently met the tallest player in the NBA at 7 ft. 6 in. He belongs to the 9th Ward. His name is Shawn Bradley. He used to play for the Dallas Mavericks as their Center. He is a very nice guy and didn't mind when we asked if we could have a picture taken with him. I know he is famous and probably gets hounded by fans and people all the time, so we didn't want to bother him, but he was happy to let us have a picture with him. He wears a size 17 shoe! Elder Stout is 6 ft. 7 in. and barely came to his shoulders.

The church is true. That is all that really matters. I hope I'm doing all the Lord is asking of me. I love being a missionary and serving in this sacred capacity. Please keep sending me the Missionary section of the ward news letter, I enjoy reading it.
