Dear Brothers and Sisters of the Dana Ward,
The diet I have been on since the first of the
year has really affected my perspective about
food and the importance we give it. I hope you
will forgive me as I share with you a couple of
thoughts along this line.

The appropriate food and drink we consume each day helps us to enjoy our temporal existence. To do this we eat and drink several times a day. To enhance our temporal experience we can cook different things or even go out to eat at a restaurant. It is even possible to consume more than is necessary to sustain a healthy life style. Knowing this could happen, the Lord, in His wisdom, blessed us with Section 89 of the Doctrine and Covenants – more commonly referred to as the Word of Wisdom.

Now, just as our body needs nourishment to sustain life, so our spirit needs to be fed as well. For years we have been reminded of the need to feed ourselves, spiritually. The council we continually receive consists of two beginning steps – daily reading of our scriptures and prayer. Wherefore, do not spend money for that which is of no worth, nor your labor for that which cannot satisfy. Hearken diligently unto me, and remember the words which I have spoken; and come unto the Holy One of Israel, and feast upon that which perisheth not, neither can be corrupted, and let your soul delight in fatness. Behold, my beloved brethren, remember the words of your God; pray unto him continually by day, and give thanks unto his holy name by night. Let your hearts rejoice."(2 Nephi 9:50 – 52 Italics added)

Our Church leaders council us to use wisdom in our actions, and to balance and manage our time appropriately. Just as Elder Oakes pointed out, there are good choices, better choices, and best choices. As we enter this new month in which we celebrate our freedoms as a country, it is my prayer that we will also reflect upon our spiritual freedoms as well. We have been richly blessed on both counts and I hope we will take advantage of our opportunities to feast spiritually and allow our souls to "delight in [spiritual] fatness." his experiences in the 'Bible Belt' of our country. There is a church on almost every street corner, of almost every denomination, except LDS. Almost daily, he meets folks who are anxious to hold heated discussions about their religious beliefs and reassure that they do NOT need the 'Mormon' message!

Serving as Zone Leader keeps him busy with district meetings, splits, companion exchanges, interviews and of course knocking on doors and being a missionary. "We have been knocking on so many doors recently that my knuckles bled. My companion and I have found more English speaking people that are interested in learning about the gospel, than Spanish speaking people. We are really helping the English speaking Elders in the area!!"

Sunday, the 27th, Mexico played Argentina in soccer and most of the Spanish Ward we are in, stayed home to watch the game. Only 16 members were there when church started! One of our recent converts, Wily Bueno, came to church and blessed the sacrament for the first time. Wily was baptized two months ago. It is amazing what the gospel does to and for people."

They continue to find humble people who strive to learn the things they need to know to have a happy and fuller life and to be obedient to gospel principles. Elder Driggs and his companion are currently working with several individuals and families that have expressed a desire to be baptized. With good hearted humor, Elder Driggs says almost everyone they meet out tracting, has a young child on one hip, a dog in the yard and a front tooth missing! But he is quick to point out that he loves the people of the Dallas Mission and enjoys getting to know them and feels that his own testimony grows as he watches theirs grow and develop.

Sister Driggs attended a family wedding in Idaho Falls, Idaho this past month and was able to visit with one of Mark's former companions who is now an RM. Sister Driggs enjoyed hearing some of the experiences this young man shared with her son and

even shed a few tears. (Missionary Moms do that!) The Church is true in Longview!

I THE MICRONESIA GUAM MISSION!

My MTC companion, Elder South, who started his mission on Chuuk, came here to Pohnpei about 12 weeks ago and he recently finished his language mastery. He is going to be the new Zone Leader with my last companion, Elder Larson. They are going to be really good together and I'm excited for him. Three of the missionaries serving here on Pohnpei will be ending their missions this transfer and a total of 14 missionaries from throughout the mission, will be returning home. Basically, it means that there are either 3 or 4 new missionaries that will be coming here to Pohnpei. The only other variable is another elder from my group, Elder Keel. He has been in his area as long as I have been here in my area and his companion has been told that he is training a new missionary. That means that Elder Keel is either going to be transferred here with me in Mand or he is going to be leaving Pohnpei and going to Guam. If Elder Keel goes to Guam, then I will be training a missionary, at least in the Pohnpeian language, if not as a new missionary. My companion is one of the Elders going home, so I know that I will be getting a new companion. Whatever will be, will be, but it always makes missionaries either look forward to, or dread coming transfers. In many ways, it adds a little excitement to our lives!

Our P-days have been moved to Mondays now, but I think it's going to work out well. I am also teaching the Gospel Doctrine class here in my branch. I read it through first in English, from the manual, and then make up a lesson plan in Pohnpeian. It definitely puts a new spin on what's going on in that class. I actually pay attention and learn things now! We have a few new investigators now so things are starting to pick *******

We did get our transfer calls last week and I am staying here in Mand. My new companion is Elder Iglacia from the Philippines and he has been in the mission field for 10 months. This is his first assignment to Pohnpei so I am training him in the Pohnpeian language. I am now the Senior Companion which doesn't really mean much except

that I am the only missionary that knows any of the local language here in my area. It's making a big change for me because I am the only one doing any of the teaching and talking and such. Elder Iglacia is good though and he will learn Pohnpeian well and quickly. Remember us in your prayers.



President Thomas 5. Monson dedicated the **Cebu City Philippines Temple** June 13th. It is the 2nd temple in the

Philippines (Manila) and the


133rd temple of the Church worldwide. When the Manila temple was dedicated 25 years

ago, there were 80,000 members. Now there are 630,000 members in the Philippines.

The Church has also announced the planned open house and rededication for the Laie, Hawaii Temple renovation. The open house will be held Oct 22 thru Nov 13. Dedication services will be Nov 21. The temple originally was dedicated 27 Nov 1919 by then Pres. Heber J. Grant as the 5th operating temple and the first built outside of Utah. It is located on the NE shore of the island of Oahu. The temple sits next to BYU-Hawaii campus and the Polynesian Cultural Center.

More than a year after the Church announced plans to build a **temple in Gilbert**, the church has unveiled its design for the high-profile structure as included here.

The 83,000 square foot temple will use ivory-colored stone and concrete and feature leaded-glass windows. A 195 foot spire will rise from the center of the three story structure, capped by a statue of a trumpeting angel Moroni. Colorful gardens with water features and accent lighting around the temple are meant to encourage contemplation,



meditation and rest. The 15 acre site near Greenfield and Pecos roads will have 658 parking spaces and room for a future meeting house which will probably be built within two to four years. Pre-construction work on the temple site should begin soon and once the design receives final approval from the Gilbert Design Review Board, a formal groundbreaking ceremony will be held. It is estimated that it will take approximately 2 years to complete the temple.

The Church has also announced details for the 9,000 sq. ft. **Brigham City, Utah temple**. Many features of the Logan, Manti and Salt Lake temples will be incorporated into the architecture. The outside walls will be a warm white, pre-cast concrete limestone.

The existing sycamore trees lining Main St. will remain and fruit trees will be added to the landscape to blend with the agriculture of the local area. It will be built across the street from the existing tabernacle.

Parking will be included for 250 vehicles. The groundbreaking ceremony will be held July 31, 2010.

The Mormon Tabernacle Choir will present a **Pioneer Day Commemoration Concert** on Fri. July 16 @ 7:30pm (6:30 Az. time) in the Conference Center. It will be rebroadcast Sat., July 17 on BYU Television and at various times on the Satellite Broadcast Network of the Church. Check local listings for accurate local times.

Ward Temple night will be Thursday, July 22, 2010, the 6pm session, or whichever session you can attend.



A Pioneer Story - "The Brooklyn"

When it was decided that the Saints must move west from Nauvoo or face even worse persecution than they were currently enduring, some of the brethren were in the eastern states directing the work of the Church there. The members of the Church in the vicinity of New York wished to go west also. Traveling overland from New York to Nauvoo would place them in danger from many enemies of the Church.

One of the brethren in the east was Samuel Brannan, a man with great executive ability. Orson Pratt appointed Brother Brannan to take charge of moving the eastern Saints to the west and he made arrangements to have them sail from New York to San Francisco in the ship



Brooklyn.

This would be a long voyage as they had to sail south and around the extreme tip of South America and then north to San Francisco, which was then called Yerba Buena by the Spaniards and Mexicans. California was Mexican territory but it was taken by the United States in the Mexican War, in which the Mormon Battalion took part.

Two hundred and thirty-five of the Saints decided to make this journey. They chartered the ship for \$1200 and this amount was divided among the various members of their party. They each paid \$50 per adult and \$25 each for their provisions. Children between 5 and 14 paid half fare.

On Feb. 4, 1846, the first company of Saints left Nauvoo by ox-team and the eastern Saints boarded the Brooklyn and sailed out of New York harbor. They took with them, farm tools and seeds that could be used to 'get started' when they reached their destination. Also on board the vessel were 2 cows, 40 pigs and a number of chickens. The second day out, they ran into a heavy storm and nearly everyone on board became very seasick. But the storm passed quickly and they soon had good winds. When they crossed the equator, they encountered a calm and with no wind, they were unable to make any progress. The heat in the tropics was almost more than some of them could bear. As they finally moved south of the equator, they ran into one of the worst storms known to the members of the crew who had sailed this area for many years. The ship rolled so badly that furniture and cargo were tossed from one side of the ship to the other. Children and those who were sick had to be strapped in their beds for fear of being thrown about the ship. At last, all the passengers were taken into the very bottom of the ship for protection. At night, there was little light and the rolling of the ship made it unsafe to light

the kerosene lanterns.

Frightened children cried and those who were sick groaned, making their shipboard conditions even worse.

In the middle of the storm, the captain went down to where the Saints were huddled

together and said to them, "My friends, there is a time in every man's life when it is fitting that he should prepare to die. That time has come for us and unless God interposes, we shall all go to the bottom. I have done all in my power but this is the worst gale I have ever known since I have served as master of a ship." One of the sisters spoke up and said, "Captain, we left for California and we shall get there." Several others responded positively. The captain was surprised at their confidence and went back up the stairs, saying, "These people have faith that I have not. They are either fools or they know more than I do."

The storm subsided. When they were circling Cape Horn, the tip of S. America, another bad storm arose and one of the sailors was washed overboard. Sister Laura Goodwin was thrown down the stairs as the ship tossed in the sea and she died from her injuries. She left a husband and 6 little children.

As they finally rounded the Cape and headed north, it became evident that they now had other problems. Their drinking water had been carried from New York in barrels and it had become so thick with slime that they had to strain it before it could be used. As their provisions dwindled, they were reduced to only a pint of water each day per person. Finally the ship was able to land at the Island

of Juan Fernandez, the island where Robinson Crusoe had stayed for so many years. The happy Saints were allowed to go ashore for a brief time and fresh water

and food was obtained. They were able to rest from their journey for a short time. They also caught fish and eels on the island and enjoyed the great pleasure of a good bath in fresh water. Sister Goodwin was also buried there.

Rested and refreshed, they boarded the ship and soon were sailing north again. In the warm sunshine, children played on the ship deck and mothers held school classes for their youngsters.

They reached the Hawaiian Islands May 9, 1846 and sailed into Honolulu Harbor. They were again able to rest but were warned by officials that they should take guns with them and be prepared to defend themselves when

they arrived at San Francisco because of trouble arising from the Mexican War. They bought a number of guns for \$3 and \$4 apiece.

They reached San Francisco on July 31, a full year before the first wagons reached Salt Lake Valley. When the officials boarded their ship, they announced that San Francisco was now a part of the United States and they were among friends. A cannon was fired from the fort to salute the arrival of the Brooklyn.

The Saints unloaded their belongings and set up a few tents but most of them were given quarters in some of the army barracks there. The barracks were long, spacious buildings and the families hung up quilts to partition off rooms until they could travel inland to meet the rest of the Saints in the Salt Lake Valley. Much transpired with the Saints in California.

Samuel Brannan with all his gift of persuasion, was not able to convince Brigham Young to bring the Utah Saints to California. President Young pointed out that he, like the Prophet Joseph Smith, had seen in a vision where the Church was to be established. He further pointed out to Brother Brannon that the Lord was not interested in wealth, but in the spiritual growth of his people.

Brannan had lost site of their original objective and in becoming the first California millionaire, got involved in gambling, selling liquor and other vices. Brannan's wife left him and took their children to Germany. Eventually he lost all of his wealth and died penniless. Many of the Mormon Battalion were discharged and joined the California Saints, and were also involved in the discovery of gold at Sutter's Fort. Eventually most of them traveled on to Utah where they joined the rest of the Saints.

Their travel by ship had been successful but the dangers and time involved in such passage proved to not be practical for future groups of Church immigrants. Nevertheless, the Good Ship Brooklyn's voyage is an important part of the Mormon Immigration Story.
