A teacher agrees to meet after hours with a parent who is unable to attend a regularly scheduled parent-teacher conference.



Hey – We got transfers this past week and I am still on Pohnpei Island, but have been transferred from the Mand Branch to what is called the 'Nett area' which is the only companionship of our mission that covers 2 branches. Actually, they are smaller than branches and are actually called 'Units'. There are no local leaders and they only meet for Sacrament Meeting, Because of the lack of leadership, I am also serving as the acting Branch President or the equivalent thereof. I am the one who sits up front and announces everything and calls on people to speak and pray, etc. I have to be prepared to speak if those called fail to take up the whole time. My new companion is Elder Crapo and this is his 2nd transfer of his mission. We are back on bikes – in fact, they are the same bikes I started on here on Pohnpei. I am really enjoying Nett. They have been having some missionary success and we are working with a guy who is planning on being baptized this coming week-end.

I got a letter from a friend there in Mesa. He has been struggling to lose some weight which was preventing him from turning in his mission papers. I thought he had given up on a mission, when I got mail from him. He had attended a stake fireside and the Stake Pres. spoke about the importance of serving a mission. He promised the youth that if they would make themselves available, then everything else would fall into place. After the fireside, my friend approached the Stake Pres. and shook his hand and looked him in the eyes and said, "I'm available." He said the President's eyes teared up and he told him to work extra hard for the next 2 weeks to lose 10 lbs and then call him and he would send in his papers that very day. I am so happy for him.

I had some really neat experiences this past month. While still in Mand, my companion and I stopped to visit Francisco Anton who we had been teaching. Francisco had been praying about getting baptized. When we arrived, he told us he felt awful and had a lot of pain in his left shoulder, hot and cold flashes and a bad headache and cold symptoms. We explained Priesthood Blessings to him and then asked if he would like us to give him a blessing. I had never given a health blessing in the Pohnpeian language before. Anyway, he did request a blessing and we gave him one. We stopped back the next day to see how he was doing and to help him with a few things. When we reached his house, he was out working in the yard, completely recovered from his sickness and pain. It was such a special experience and to see the power of the priesthood work so fast. That same week, we visited our previous convert, Johnny Johnny and he was in such pain with a boil on his stomach. We offered to give him a blessing and he pleaded for a blessing saying that he couldn't even sleep because of the pain. Also in Pohnpeian, we promised him that he would sleep well that night and would overcome his sickness. Two days later, when we visited him, he said he was pain free and in good health, and the boil was draining just fine. He said he had not had any further problems since his blessing and was so grateful for the relief. These were such good experiences with the power of the priesthood.

I noticed that family members are complaining about the humidity and heat there in Mesa. Is that like 90-100% humidity? That's what we deal with every day here!

President Dowdle gave me a nice compliment at our recent zone conference and interviews. He said I had responded well to the "push off the cliff" that I had received at my previous transfer and said "it was either fly or die, and you flew". He told me that I had been an agent of change in Mand. I hope I was a good influence in people's lives. At that point, I was fine with either staying in Mand or being transferred. I truly was willing to go and do whatever the Lord wanted for me. This mission has taught me so much and I am grateful for my many experiences.

Meet Joe and Johnnie Dickson who have lived at 234 S. Hill ever since Joe cleared the nest of dinosaurs out of his back yard, eons ago! Joe is the descendant of lots of Mormon Pioneers. His great grandfather was Ezekiel Lee, the first Dr. in Utah. His medical tools are on display in the Church History Museum in S.L., along with the handcart he pulled from Omaha. Joe was born and grew up in Layton, Utah. He was working in Logan when he met another young man who talked him into going home to El Paso, Texas with him, to work on his father's ranch. He introduced Joe to his sister Johnnie, who was 15 yrs. old. Joe says he had to work for her father for 3 years so she could grow up and he could marry her. 


