

I didn't get transferred but my companion did. The sister from Pohnpei is my new companion. I love having Sister Kalio as my companion. I don't think President knew how crazy we are. We laugh all day long. We keep joking that we are racking up the list of problems that we have to discuss about getting along with each other. We really have no problems with each other.



We run a couple times a week in the morning and then we do hula the other days. By association, I'm going to be a pro at hula and the ukulele. She just laughs at me because she says I am very sorry at hula techniques! This white girl can't move like that!

We are already planning a trip after our missions when I can go visit her in Pohnpei. We are more like real sisters than companions. We so enjoy playing pranks on the Elders. I think they all feel like they are cursed having the two of us together, against them! It's all in fun though!

So, we had some INCREDIBLE missionary experiences this week! A member called and said she wanted to have us over for dinner and that they would have a friend there to teach. So, we taught him on Tuesday and the lesson was so powerful! Every time Sister Kalio bears her testimony, it is as if the house

shakes. She says her English is bad but it is so good and when she testifies, you can tell it is from the heart and with such conviction. It always gives me goose bumps thinking about it. We invited him – that night - to be baptized - and he said YES!!! And before we even invited him he said, "I want to read The Book of Mormon." He came to church yesterday and was fully participating in the lessons.

We went to see a less- active but she had moved. The person that answered the door, just moved here from Salt lake. She let us in and told us how she was taking the lessons in Utah and that she liked going to church with the missionaries. We went back the next day and her boyfriend answered and we told him who we are. He wants to learn too. Is that Awesome or what?!

A member invited us for dinner last night and had their friend over for a lesson. It turned out that we had met him at the nursing home. We taught him last night and invited him to be baptized and he said, "I have no reason to not do that." He also said how he had felt the Spirit so strong last night.

We have a total of 4 people on date for baptism. I think the work is going incredibly well. I think it is because people see that Sister Kalio and I love being missionaries - so more people are starting to refer us to their friends. The White family are doing so well. They all came to church on Sunday but only stayed for Sacrament Meeting. They left early because Bro. White is still recovering from his surgery and wasn't feeling too well. We have taught them a few times. They are a fun family and I can't wait for them to all get back fully in the gospel.

Yesterday we were invited to eat lunch at a ranch. They had some goats and we had a short gospel discussion with the goats!

We are having a lot of success out in La Mana. My new companion is Elder Charnay and he is from Chile.

We have been working with a very special family of 9 children, named Auxiliandora. They wanted to be baptized but we had to work thru the marriage process first. Marriage involves a lot of paperwork and it is very expensive for these people. We finally helped them meet all their requirements and they were baptized on Easter Sunday. That made for a very special Easter this year for me. I love this family and have already seen the change in their lives. After their baptism, both parents bore their testimony, which was very sweet. One of the children is already a member and calls me his

'cousin' and says he wants to be a missionary just like me when he grows up. That makes me really happy!



We also had a baptism the next night. These two girls have had the saddest lives I've ever heard of. They were abandoned 5 years ago by their mother and their father is in jail. But they are awesome! It is so difficult to fill the font in our small church building. There is no running water. We have to do it all with buckets from the reserve water tank outside. We tried to innovate and cleaned out some large mop buckets and wheeled them in. It took us 3 hours to fill the font



but we did it!

The next week, we had another baptism and decided we absolutely had to find a more efficient way to fill the font. We walked over to the fire department and asked them if they could help us. They sent a fire truck and crew to our aid and it only took them five minutes. They even gave us a ride in the fire truck. It was the first time my comp has ever been in a fire truck. It brought a lot of memories back of our ward block parties in Mesa.

Yesterday Brother Sigifredo received the priesthood. He can now baptize everyone that we teach. Last night we asked him if he could make a visit with us so of course he and his wife both came. They always go together. We visited a less active member. He said he's been less active for about 11 years and now he is a super spiritual monster. So we had a really good lesson with them. I think the experience will help change his life. So we now have somebody to go out with us all the time. I'm super happy! The ward has been so supportive and gives us a lot of assistance. The result is a dramatic increase in baptisms. Everything is good in Ecuador!



I had a couple of emergencies this past week. My shoes were so full of holes, I declared them 'dead' and bought a pair of Ecua-shoes. The shop keeper assures me they will last my entire mission! I think that's what they told me in Mesa when I bought the last pair! Also- I got really sick with a stomach bug and ended up in the hospital for the night. Talk about an adventure that I don't want to repeat! I ran a high fever and felt horrible but I am feeling better now and I only missed 2 days of missionary work. Elder Osegueda took care of me like Mom would. The zone leaders both came and visited me. Elder Gossling thought I was dying and he was really worried. He's the Elder from Mountain View. But we get along very well in spite of our 'school rivalry'.

We had a meeting with President Amaya. Sunday, Elder Scott and Christoferson from the "Big 12", spoke to Ecuador by way of satellite (they both know Spanish by the way).

Pray for the missionaries in our home ward and help with the work.

Oldest UA Grad Recalls Time at School

Jess Root, along with four dozen other centenarians, was honored on Arizona's 100th birthday in February.

When Arizona celebrated its 100th birthday in February, Gov. Jan Brewer hosted a brunch for about 50 special guests. All of them were alive when Arizona joined the Union on Feb. 14, 1912.

Many are transplanted from other parts of the country, but the oldest native Arizonan at the festivities was Jess Root, who may also be the oldest living alumnus of the University of Arizona.

A few of the memories are starting to fade with time, but Root still remembers what it was like going to school at the UA in the early 1930s. Now 105 and living in Mesa, Ariz., with his daughter, Root graduated in 1934, during some of the darkest days of the Great Depression.

Jess Root was born just a few days before Christmas in 1906 in Pima, Ariz., one of a handful of neighboring agricultural communities nestled along the Gila River that includes Safford, Thatcher, Solomon and Central. Growing up, Root went to school, including his first two years of college, at what would eventually become Eastern Arizona College in Thatcher.

As a transfer student, Root joined a UA campus significantly smaller than today's, contained then by Park Avenue on the west, Cherry Avenue on the east and Second and Fourth streets on the north and south.

Only the newly completed Arizona Stadium, finished in 1929, fell outside the boundaries. About half of the 24 buildings on campus then still survive and are on the National Register of Historic Places.

Tucson, with about 33,000 residents, was booming. The city's population had grown five fold since the turn of the century, in no small part due to a growing university and its 2,200 students.

Root called his UA experience "very agreeable." He majored in chemistry, took classes in math and physics, joined a fraternity and played baseball for coach Fred Enke.

Tuition was "about \$40 a semester, and that was big money in those days," he said. "I hashed my way through school working at the Copper Kettle Café," a restaurant in the square at Park and University.

"Going in as a junior, I missed out on some of the freshman activities, but I got along just fine," he said. Old Main was the central hub of the UA. Root said he marveled at the size of Bear Down, a gym that could accommodate three basketball games at

a time. He spent his first semester living at Cochise Hall, earning a bit of money there by sweeping up, before moving to a fraternity house.

And despite the poor economy, there was still fun to be had in Tucson.

"During Prohibition, the fraternity had a Model A touring car, so every once in a while we would go down to Douglas or Nogales for fun. They took me along to drive back home because I didn't do too much drinking. One night at a dance, they paired me with a (considerably taller) 6-foot girl as a prank. But we danced and had a lot of fun."

Root said he was active in athletics, playing baseball and tennis and running track.

He said he also acquired a nickname in college.
Playing baseball in Douglas against a team from
Mexico, "the girls there would say 'Hey, Charlie, if
you hit a home run, we'll give you a kiss.' After that
I was known as Charlie."

Root flirted briefly with pro baseball, playing with the Safford Haybailers after he graduated, but his career took him elsewhere.

With his chemistry degree, Root headed for Globe hoping to land a job in the assay office for the Old Dominion Mine, a major copper producer.

Unfortunately, the mine flooded and operations shut down, although it subsequently became a reservoir for the town.

Back home in Safford, Root said the high school teacher there offered him a part-time job teaching.

"So I taught Spanish, algebra and general science. Then the CCC (Civilian Conservation Corps) came along and I got a job with them as an educational adviser until they closed. Then I got a teaching in Ash Fork (west of Flagstaff) until WWII started.

"Because I had a degree in chemistry, the Army sent me to their chemical warfare center for about three years before they moved me into military intelligence, and I served the rest of the time there. I went to OCS (Officer Candidate School) but they found out I was color blind, so that prevented me from becoming an officer."

After the war, Root started teaching in Thatcher and married a teacher from Safford, Rowena Richardson. The couple had two sons and a daughter, and moved to Phoenix where Root opened a clinical laboratory for hospitals.

Asked when he was last on the UA campus, Root said he took his two young sons to see a football game in Arizona Stadium to watch UA running back Art Luppino, the Cactus Comet, who in 1954 lead the nation in rushing, scoring, all-purpose running, and kickoff returns and became the first player in NCAA history to lead the nation in rushing twice.

Root has long since retired, and has outlived virtually everyone he went to school with, but he was one of the many thousands of Arizonans who were instrumental in using their skills to build the state during the mid-20th century. Of his time at the UA, he didn't hesitate to say that he'd do it all over again.

"I enjoyed it. I had a good time," he said, and added, "Bear Down."

The above photo (2-18-12) shows the facing stone almost completed on the north side of the temple which faces Pecos Rd. and the west side (Greenfield Rd) rapidly being fitted with the stone facing.



Photo taken 1 May, 2012 of N and W sides of the temple, which are now completely faced in stone. The spire is almost completed with stone facing which is assembled much like a puzzle. Each piece of facing is designed to fit a particular spot. The east side of the temple, which will be the front, was without any stone facing Apr 15th, but has since, almost been completed with the outer stone facing. Protective, temporary plywood panels have been installed in all window slots and the glass will be added at a future date.

The launch of the 1940 US Census Community Project is underway to digitize these records and index them to make them easily available online to everyone for free.

Every person matters! An army of volunteers is needed to INDEX the records of 132 million people living in the USA in 1940. YOU CAN HELP!! Indexing is done at home, at your own pace, is verified for accuracy, and it's EASY to do. All you need is internet access and a desire to give service. Even small amounts of time are valuable. When you sign on again, your screen will be right back to where you left off. You can get started today and practice on beta records, or begin with existing records. Sign in: LDS.org / Menu / Service / Volunteer / Index FH Records / Sign in (using LDS sign on) / Start Tell your friends (without an LDS sign on) to join the cause by registering at The 1940Census.com. The project can also be found on blog@the1940census.com This project is a perfect springboard for YW Medallion projects, YM Duty to God or Eagle projects, and filling service hours.

There is now a free app for smartphones and tablet devices that has two purposes: draw in new volunteers to the worldwide indexing effort and provide new ways for them and others to index the newly released 1940 US Census Records and other records, for FamilySearch.org. Once indexed, these records are available FOR FREE on the church FamilySearch web site to members and non-members alike.

For younger people (and older people too) who have mobile devices, this is a way for them to participate in the indexing program. The new app makes it possible to index one name at a time, or for short periods of time, while a person is waiting in line, riding a bus or in other small time blocks. Long blocks of time are not necessary. This is more addicting than "Angry Birds", and has benefits for millions

of people. As soon as you submit one name, another name pops up, and then, you're tempted to submit that one too. If you are going to be addicted to texting anyway, try this and have some productive fun with it!

These records are not accessible in an indexed format until they have all been entered by volunteers! Once they are indexed, you can find a name simply by typing in the name and clicking a button, rather than searching individual pages by address, county and state to find an individual name.
