

Dear Dana Ward -

Our Zone got to participate in a humanitarian service project a couple of weeks ago. We donned the standard yellow T-shirts that say "Mormon Helping Hands" and traveled out into the local countryside, visiting ranches and remote areas to do a combination of needed services. We gave haircuts, did some needed cleaning chores and offered a health clinic. I was assigned to help out with the Medical stuff. They had me taking blood pressures, temperatures, pulses, respirations, and testing their blood for diabetes. Now I know why God allowed me to go to my EMT school. Just before I finished, we had just learned and practiced taking blood readings for diabetes. It was neat to actually get to practice some of the skills I learned before my mission.

My embarrassment of the week happened while we were out doing door contacts. We met a lady who didn't particularly care to listen to our message but she referred us to a neighbor she thought might be interested. So we continued down the street, and knocked on her door. She is AWESOME! She is really interested and really fun. We were in the middle of the lesson and her little toddler son was fiddling around in his chair. I was watching him while my companion was giving the mother a lesson. There was a crystal looking dish near the little boy and he bumped it about that time and it started falling over. I went into an automatic reaction and dove from the couch across the entire room and caught the dish right before it touched the concrete floor and

shattered. I was stunned that I caught it. This dive seriously could have been on ESPN. It was so beautiful in every way. I had form and length and everything. I saved this expensive dish! As I'm laying there on the lady's floor with this dish in my hands, it occurred to me that it was really light in weight. That's when I realized that it was made of PLASTIC! With this new knowledge, I looked up and saw that I had scared my comp half to death and the lady had a stunned look on her face, but was impressed with my intentions and performance. I sheepishly stood up, cleared my throat and said, "I saved your plastic dish." At that point, EVERYONE busted out laughing. I felt like an idiot, but everyone was so impressed with the catch that it didn't matter. We finished the lesson and thank goodness she invited us to come back to give her another lesson.

Ok - on a more spiritual note; We visited our recent convert, Leticia, the other day. While we were there, her husband came up and asked me when I was going to baptize him. So we taught him the first lesson about Joseph Smith, watched a movie about him and then invited him to get baptized on the 16th which he accepted very excitedly. So we have another baptism scheduled!

It was way awesome to hear family voices on my call home on Mother's Day. The hardest part for me was to try to remember how to speak English. I've only had totally Spanish speaking companions since I began my mission and it is a real struggle to think or speak in English now.

We had a zone conference this month, which was sweet. I got to stay in a mansion (for Mexico) for the night so we didn't have to travel at 3 in the morning to get to Monterrey. It was awesome and included some 'luxuries' missionaries are not used to. We also attended a meeting where Elder Bednar of the Twelve was speaking. I got to shake his hand. Sweet! Hello Everyone!

So far, things are 'mui bien'. Way easier and more comfortable than the first few weeks. My comp, Elder Preston, and I have been teaching our first investigator, Gary, from Honduras. He is actually a teacher here at the MTC, but we were 'practicing' on him. We taught him and during one lesson, my comp was explaining stuff about the Restoration. I honestly don't know all of what he said but I had a prompting to share my testimony. I could see my comp was struggling with what to say and it was just getting really deep. At a break, I asked my comp to ask Gary (AKA Hermano Voss) If I could share my testimony. So I did and it was pretty sweet. The spirit was definitely there. It is so essential to have the spirit and I realize that more and more every day.

I had a neat experience during personal study. I got out my English Book of Mormon to read the chapter heading in English because I've been reading

the book of Mormon in Spanish. I came across some quotes. I read a quote by Elder Bednar. He said that often as Members, we have that feeling that the spirit has to be some big emotional thing and that it only happens on a rare occasion. The exact opposite is true though. More often than not, the Spirit will speak quietly and it may be as simple as a peaceful or inspirational thought. The Lord does know us and I can testify of that. I read that quote at the exact time I needed it.

We had an amazing speaker last night. I don't remember his last name but he told us at the beginning of his talk to not try to copy every word he said in his notes but rather listen to el Espiritu and see what we learned that way. My experience doing that was pretty amazing.

I have realized that I need to love my companion with Christlike love and not sweat the small stuff so I can have the spirit with me. Any companion does little things that bug us. Those things will only bug us if we let them, so we just need to "Stop it". I've made a real breakthrough in the way I see and understand my companion and it is a change for the good for both of us.

I'm really loving all the experiences here! It's such a testimony building, faith challenging and character building experience. We held our first Fast Sunday which was really good. I shared my testimony mostly en Espanol but with some English. I shared in Spanish, my favorite quote that President Millett always told us; "El Evangelio es verdadero, entonces nada esta importa".

Our Zone was reorganized this week. It consists of 6 elders and 5 sisters, many of them new to the MTC. They seem to be adjusting well and I hope that I can set a good example for them and help them if they need it.

I think I have been trying too hard and not enjoying my experience here. So far, we have been taught by Elders L. Tom Perry, D. Todd Christoferson and M. Russell Ballard. What awesome teachers and learning experiences for us. I learned from them that I shouldn't be so uptight that I don't enjoy the blessings of the gospel. Relax and let the blessings flow over me, be patient with the language, enjoy the Spirit. I don't need to kill myself in struggles. I should leave the MTC with a decent amount of vocabulary and a burning love of the gospel in my bones. That

was exactly what I needed to hear! This past week I took a leap of faith and went into a lesson without any notes. I had studied hard and felt pretty comfortable with the things I wanted to say and went in and said all that I needed and wanted to and then some more stuff that I didn't even know I could say in Spanish.

I know that Jesus Christ lives and he loves us so much. He has suffered for all of us. No wonder he expects us to follow him, to keep his commandments and is sad when we choose to do otherwise. I keep learning so much about the gospel and know the Lord is helping me learn Spanish and as I exercise faith I can really feel empowered.

In June 2011, Deseret Book launched Deseret Bookshelf which is a free e-reader app for Apple and Android mobile devices that not only allows you to read e-books, but also access a library of LDS books and Deseret Book's library of nearly 1,500 digital titles for purchase. This allows you to research by single words of gospel topics, and get results back in seconds. Scripture references are immediately viewable and text can be highlighted and pages bookmarked. In books like Elder David A. Bednar's book, "Increase in Learning", video has been imbedded into the reading experience. The e-book comes alive as you watch video segments in which Elder Bednar leads discussions and asks questions that relate to the reading material. It allows a deeper, more reflective learning experience than is

possible with a book alone. More titles will take advantage of these capabilities as they become available.

Currently, the free titles for download are: Autobiography of Parley P. Pratt, Discourses of Brigham Young, Gospel Doctrine by Joseph F. Smith, Joseph Smith History by Lucy Mack Smith, Jesus the Christ by James E. Talmage, Lectures on Faith by Joseph Smith, The Miracle of Forgiveness by Pres. Spencer W. Kimball, Teachings of the Prophet Joseph Smith compiled by Joseph Fielding Smith and the LDS Standard Works. All of these are cross indexed with each other.

You can add additional titles by searching Deseret Book online library and making a purchase. The e-book is immediately downloaded and becomes available to read on your mobile device. Many popular new titles are available as well as archives and books that have been out of print and hard to find for years. Nearly 1,500 titles are now available with dozens of new titles being added each week.

THE PROVO CITY CENTER TEMPLE

Out of the ashes of a beloved tabernacle, the Church will build the Provo City Center Temple. Elder Jeffrey R. Holland presided at the groundbreaking of Provo's second temple on May 12, 2012. A devastating fire gutted the historic Provo Tabernacle in Dec. of 2010.

Since 1898, the building was a community gathering place for meetings and cultural events in Provo. After the fire. Church leaders contemplated the future of the tabernacle shell and Pres. Thomas S. Monson announced during general conference in Oct. of 2011 that a temple would be constructed on the site, preserving the 'castle-like' original appearance. The Provo City Center Temple is expected to be completed in three years and will include underground parking. More than 5,600 people gathered on the future temple grounds for the groundbreaking ceremonies. Elder Holland stated that he was thrilled with the significance of two temples located within a mile of each other in "the shadow of 'Y mountain' and near the shores of Utah Lake." The current Provo temple is the busiest temple in the world, due to its location near the 56,000 student campus of BYU. For more than 100 years, the Provo Tabernacle hosted stake conferences and worship services of all kinds, firesides, funerals, lectures, concerts and graduation services. It has heard the voice of at least one president of the United States, William Howard Taft, and at least 12 presidents of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints

The Provo City Center temple is one of 29 temples announced by President Thomas S. Monson since he became the president of the Church a little more than four years ago.

HARTFORD TEMPLE PLANS

From the Hartford Courant Newspaper 10 May, 2012.

Representatives from The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints have submitted their architectural plans for the state's first Mormon temple.

The plans for the 11-acre parcel off Farmington Avenue were shown this week to members of the conservation and inlands wetlands commission. They include renderings of the proposed temple as well as those of the president's residence and a service building.

According to the design, the white granite, one-story, 28,610-square-foot temple would be 115 feet tall at its highest point. It would have more than 40 rooms, including separate men's and women's dressing areas, a confirmation room, a baptistry, a dressing room for brides, waiting rooms, two counselor's offices and an office for the president. Eight of the rooms would be reserved exclusively for instruction.

The temple would face the intersection of Melrose Drive and Farmington Avenue. The spire on the top of the structure would be capped with a gold-leaf statue of the angel Moroni.

To the right of the temple on the parcel would sit a 2,260-square-foot residence that would serve as the temple president's home. A 680-square-foot two-car garage is also included in the plan. Behind the house and to the back right of the temple would be a 753-square-foot service building.

Concrete and stone pathways would snake through dozens of shrubs and trees on the grounds. According to the renderings, there will be a variety of "shade trees," "ornamental trees," and evergreens dotting the property and several islands that will be incorporated into a 193-space parking lot.

Plans for the Farmington temple first went before the town's planning and zoning commission on Jan. 23.

Moving forward, the proposal must now wind its way through a number of the town's land-use boards. In addition to the planning board, the town's inlands wetlands and watercourses agency must sign off.

Currently, Mormons in Connecticut who wish to visit a temple must travel to Belmont, Mass., **New York City** or Washington D.C.

STAR VALLEY, WYOMING TEMPLE UPDATE

The site for the Star Valley, Wyoming Temple has been selected. The new temple will be constructed east of U.S. Highway 89 on the Haderlie Farm property south of Afton, Wyoming. It will be the first temple built in Wyoming.

The Star Valley Temple was announced at the Church's October 2011 general conference. A date for construction to begin has not been released. Once started, it is expected to take approximately two years to complete.

The Church now has 166 temples in operation, announced or under construction across the globe. The Star Valley Wyoming Temple will serve members living in the western part of the state, who now travel approximately 1.5 hours to Idaho Falls and Rexburg, Idaho, for temple services.

It's been a busy month with a lot of changes for me. I was called to be the district leader in my zone in Valencia. I am still with Elder Charnay so that's been good. We had the baptism of Edwin Reyes. We have been working with him for several months and he is amazing! He was raised as an atheist and one year ago this week he had a near death experience and saw and felt the love of the Savior. He began to look for the true church and we found him or he found us. He is super awesome and has such a testimony. It was a really nice day for the baptism and after the ordinance we watched "To This End was I Born", and it was very spiritual. I could hear a bunch of women crying, and after the movie Edwin bore his testimony. It is so rewarding to

see him so happy as he entered the waters of baptism. I explained it to Elder Charnay; It's like football. You work your tail off all week, all year, just to see the Friday night lights. It's like that, we work super hard all day everyday so we can see the waters of baptism. But it's a lot more fulfilling in the water than in the lights. I love the mission and I want to spend the rest of my life doing this. Time passes too fast out here and it is starting to pass by even faster. I don't miss home at all. It feels as if I left only last month. In Mathew it says that for God, one day is a thousand years and a thousand years is one day to God. It kind of feels like that out here. But it's more like one week feels like one day and one month feels like one week. We are already almost half way through this year and it feels like only weeks. I love my mission!
