Dear Dana Ward Family,

I am certain that we are all grateful for the instruction we were privileged to hear from our church leaders during General Conference.

With the Trek Reenactment this week, it's easy to be reminded of the earliest converts of our Church and their





examples. For the most part, this was a migration of families hoping to find refuge from religious persecution. They came

by the thousands, often at great sacrifice, to live gospel teachings and to build the kingdom of God. As they trekked across the American continent, they sharpened their religious focus. They gained greater faith and grew closer to God. The Willie-Martin survivors chose not to dwell on the suffering and death they experienced and very few expressed bitterness. Almost all retained a vibrant faith in the gospel, and for some, the ordeal resulted in gaining "the absolute knowledge that God lives, for we became acquainted with him in our extremities." They practiced human kindness and brotherly love under harsh conditions. Those who died, died with dignity and faith.

These early Saints, were willing to make sacrifices for their posterity. They came with a willingness to be obedient and follow the leaders whom they sustained as prophets. They traveled with feelings of responsibility to the group and not just to their own needs and desires. They had a profound faith in God and the restoration of the gospel. We also recognize the rescue parties who risked life and limb to save their fellow stranded Saints. Their contribution cannot be overestimated.

Without rescue parties there

would probably have been no survivors.

In relating their examples to our own lives, I feel impressed to say that all will be well as long as we do our part. All injustice, unfairness and inequity will be worked out by the Savior in a day coming very soon. All we need to do is look at and work on ourselves, and to reach out and rescue others. Over and over we are reminded by the prophets to serve one another, thereby serving God. This must be a part of our nature if we expect to have our sins forgiven and become like our Father.

Lucky for myself there are so many in the Dana Ward who serve each other, for which I am very grateful. Thank you.

Trevor is the Zone leader. His comp is Elder Gutierrez. He is serving in a town along the coastline of Ecuador.

We have had 16 baptisms this past month and we have 8 more scheduled, so we will complete our goal if we just exercise a little more faith. This past Saturday, we did a service project. We dug an out house for some members and it was really hard physical labor.

A few weeks ago, Elder Gutierrez and I had been passing through a lot of trials with our Zone. We felt really bad, particularly one week. We couldn't focus really well and we didn't know what to do about the problems. We worked like mad men for a scheduled baptism and at the last minute, it fell through. We had been working hard, but didn't feel like we were having much success. We had a mission conference a couple of weeks back. Both the North and South Missions attended, so we pretty much filled the Stake Center with missionaries. Elder Christofferson and Elder Pino, who is the area president of the northern part of South America, were the speakers, along with their wives. Before the meeting began, they had us all come up and shake their hands.

Elder Pino spoke to us first and began by saying that "As I shook your hands there was an interesting spiritual connection. I know a few of you have come here today with burdened hearts and lots of problems on your minds." He spoke about how the gospel is a seed that has to be planted and then nourished to grow to maturity so the new plant (member) can grow strong enough to stand on its own. He told us that our mission will have a huge impact and influence on our lives and told us not to lose the perspective of our calling and to enjoy our time and that two years will pass really fast for us. He told us to focus on our purpose of our mission. He shared a story about his own children. They had a favorite TV program called "What Do You See?" In the program, they would show a small circle of something up real close so that it was so close and

such a small part of the 'big picture' that you couldn't usually even guess what it was. Often times, the 'close up' made the object very unappealing or unattractive. When they would show the 'whole picture' it turned out to be a delicious pizza or some other attractive object. He suggested that if you don't see the full picture, you may reject some valuable and important things in your life. You have to open your vision and see it all and that one day, our mission will be over and then he asked us after we go home from our missions, "What kind of movies will we watch? Who will we go out with or associate with? What music will we listen to?" We will have gone on our mission in vain if we don't continually make and personal progress and keep commitments.

Elder Christofferson is so cool! He talked about the things we can learn from others that have passed through trials of faith. He said love is a Spiritual Gift and that there is little defense against love. The way to help someone feel your love is through service. He also told us that we can learn and understand more about faith by living it and not by just studying it. He said that learning by the spirit is more precious than to have visions. Teaching by example and not by word is important and he reminded us that God knows each one of us perfectly. Elder Christofferson told us about when he was a Zone Leader and how he felt an awful feeling about some missionaries just like I have been feeling and he decided to go to those missionaries and speak with them. They sang hymns together and bore testimonies to each other and that solved the problems. So that's what Elder Gutierrez and I did. We talked to two of our zone missionaries and it really helped us sort things out. It was a really spiritual and growing experience for me.

I know that our Heavenly Father prepared this conference just so I would know that he loves me and he knows what has been going on with me. This conference was the answer to many prayers for my comp and I.

Well, after 6 months in Bend, Elder Ketchum was transferred to Salem, Ore. It was bitter sweet to have him go and me to stay since he won't get to see end results with several choice investigators we are working with.

My new companion is Elder Gomez. He was born in Mexico and he is fluent in both English and Spanish. He is giving me some extra Spanish help and I'm looking forward to serving with him. I've heard a lot of good things about him. Since arriving in Bend, he has been made the District Leader and has initiated some good missionary joint-time activities. As a

district, we play sports together at the church building for an hour on Tues, Thurs and Sat. (Usually Basketball or dodge ball). Mon. we do push-ups, Wed we do Abs and Friday, it's whatever exercises we need or want. He and I are doing workouts together. At first I thought it was going to kill me but it works! I have more energy during the day and I sleep better at night.

We are working with some awesome people. We tracted out a guy named Ronny. He is in his late 60's and he is actually a preacher of 40 years. He knows a lot about the scriptures. Last Sunday, he came to church and stayed for the entire 3 hour block. He seemed to have had a pretty good time. He was with our ward mission leader who is a high priest and they stuck together for the entire 3 hours. It was super cool!

Amy, who we baptized recently, brought her mother, Cheryl to church on Sunday. Amy's 12 year old son, Brandon, has just set a baptism date and his 7 year old brother, when he is old enough, wants to be baptized. Devin, Amy's husband will be able to baptize him then and at that time, they all plan to go to the temple together to be sealed. It will be so cool.

Shawn and Ashley, a young couple we are teaching, are doing really well. Shawn has been able to quit smoking and Ashley had her baby a few weeks ago. If all goes well, Ashley's grandparents are coming for the baptism of Ashley and her grandpa will baptize them.

We've been trying to be better at talking to people and we walked up to a guy on the street and we are teaching him now. He is 32 and suffers from occasional depression and is a slow learner. His name is Gabe. I am learning that some of God's choicest spirits are housed in frail frames. He is just a cool guy and is learning as we teach him.

We've been teaching Mike for 6 months (we and a former set of Elders). Yesterday morning our Ward mission leader told us that Mike has asked to be baptized. We went by and visited with him and he told us that he finally got the answers to his prayers. He KNOWS Joseph Smith was a prophet and that the Book of Mormon is TRUE! We had just about decided that we just didn't know what to do to help him progress. He said he just laid out the scriptures and prayed about it and it came to him that he is comfortable with everything and has chosen Oct 13th to enter the covenants of baptism. He has given up cigarettes, tea and alcohol. Miracles do exist. I've seen them.

Last week, we received the "Higher Law" of the OEM (Oregon Eugene Mission). Pres. Young has been praying about this for about a year. He wants the missionaries to focus more on getting results, or the end results and not the hours tracted and how many people we talk to. He said we still have to tract and talk to people, we just put our efforts into DOING IT rather than keeping track of it. He is asking us to plan more carefully to effectively help as many of Gods children come unto Christ as we can and not spend so much time worrying about meeting set numbers.

It's cooling down here now. The evenings are pleasantly cool. Just back in August, we were harvesting huge blackberries along the local roads.



The locals call them 'nuisance berries' but they were a welcome treat to hungry missionaries. I can't remember ever eating anything I found growing along an Arizona road!

After 3 months (2 of them in the MTC), my shoes wore out and they never were comfortable. My

companion gave me a pair of his "Johnston and Murphy" shoes and they are super comfortable. I've worn them 4 weeks and they are awesome. He said they cost about \$120 but hopefully they will last the rest of my mission. I threw away the Walmart pair. I guess the lesson is that sometimes you get what you pay for!

I'm honestly having the greatest time of my life. I used to wonder what missionaries meant by saying "It's the best two years of my life." You just can't explain it. Get out there and be a missionary. In last month's Ensign, there is an article about being a missionary and sharing the gospel by sharing you. The gospel is so simple. We over complicate it sometimes. The Book of Mormon is true. Elder Gomez says, "The gospel is true and the book's still blue!"

Exciting announcements were given in Saturday's morning Gen.
Conference meeting.

New temples were announced for **Tucson**, **Az**. and **Arequipa**, **Peru**. Location and construction plans were not given at this time. This will be the 6th temple for Arizona and the 3rd for Peru.

Changes were made in the Church Missionary Dept. President Thomas S. Monson announced that, effective immediately, men who are high school graduates may now begin serving at age 18 (lowered from age 19) and women at age 19 (lowered from age 21), based on individual circumstances, as well as upon a determination by local Church leaders. Mission lengths did not change. These changes were made as 'options' to our youth and worthiness, personal preparation, college, scholarships, military and other personal factors should be considered by each individual. Time spent in the MTC will be reduced by about 1/3.

New curriculum for Young Men, Young Women and Youth Sunday School classes

was announced Sept. 12, 2012. The new "Learning Resources for Youth" will replace existing manuals and Church units will begin using the curriculum in January 2013. The focus is on strengthening and building faith, conversion and testimony, using the most current teachings of the Gen. Authorities and Gen. Auxiliary Presidencies. The curriculum will be available on line and can be found on lds.org/youth/learn and in a limited number of printed manuals. It is intended to cause a shift from stand-and-deliver gospel teaching to gospel-centered conversations between youth and leaders. Since the resources are available online, parents can keep up on what their children are learning and even use it in their families. The monthly lesson topics can then be incorporated into family home evening or dinner table discussions. The curriculum is designed to allow young people to better develop their abilities to learn and teach the gospel. It can help them prepare to be effective, Christlike teachers as they serve missions and in their future homes. Instructors can start by making the classroom a safe place – a forum where young men and young women can freely share their comments and experiences without fear of being mocked.
